

New Beginnings

Work has finally started on the development of 'Houlton', the new extension to Rugby; featuring 6200 new homes, 4 new schools and extensive commercial, retail, employment & community facilities. The church in Rugby is working to be right at the centre of this new place, aiming to build community from day 1.

After investing in building relationships with the developer and local agencies for the last few years we are seeing early fruit in terms of opportunities to have a prominent role in the community as soon as residents start to arrive.

We have the chance to work with the developers on setting up and operating the first community space right at the heart of the first phase of the development and next to the marketing suite and café – enabling us to missionally serve the new community even before the first house is occupied. Later in the year we are hoping to be one of the very first families living on site, with a vicarage as one of the first few houses built, so that we can welcome each new resident to the development. Additionally, it has been recently announced that the first primary school, opening in September 2017, will be a Church of England school, so we look forward to working closely with the Diocesan Board of Education and the leadership of the school as it is appointed. There are also lots of exciting opportunities for us to be deeply involved in the longer-term thinking & planning of community and social development in Houlton.

To support all this we are gathering a group of people who will form the initial missional and worshipping community in Houlton. This will be ecumenical from the outset; with the Methodist church having appointed a new deacon to work with us, and with significant interest from Rugby Revive, the 'churches together' organisation in Rugby.

Prayer Diary

May 2016

Then Samuel took a stone and set it up between Mizpah and Jeshanah, and named it Ebenezer; for he said, "Thus far the Lord has helped us." 1 Samuel 7 v 12



There is a mountain in North Wales which I used to climb regularly as a teenager. It is one of those frustrating mountains that has several steep sections of climb which emerge onto plateaus. And just when you think you must surely be near the top, another steep climb presents itself. The most helpful thing to do was to look back to see what you have achieved already and from it to gain strength to go on to the next challenge.

It is easy to get caught up in the activity of life, the endless demands of to-do lists, e-mails, voicemails and the cycle of meetings. To become daunted by the climb ahead. To doubt that you have all the resources you need for the journey. This is when we need to stop even though it feels dangerous to do so, to reflect on the journey so far, to remember the many times when God has been utterly faithful even in the darkest and toughest of circumstances. To recall the times when the wind blew so hard that we thought all was lost - but God was there.

The journey of the people of Israel was never straight forward. The earlier verses in the passage from 1 Samuel show that there was a need to own up to their failure – to look reality squarely in the face. But, despite their failure and waywardness, the Lord helped them. And Samuel marked that truth with his stone.

Is it time, to take stock? To reflect on what has been, both good and bad? To notice, looking back, the ways in which the Lord has been present with us? To be thankful and, perhaps, repentant?

And is there a way in which we can mark this point along the way? And to say, with Samuel, that we know with certainty that thus far the Lord has helped us.

Focus on Rugby Deanery

I don't think many people know this but if you turn a map of Rugby Deanery on its side it looks like a heart. But is the church like a heart? Do we love our area and bring it life?

The top chambers (the atria) are doing what they are designed for. They are filling up! They are filling with new housing and people as Houlton (the name for the new community on the old Mast site) is built and new opportunities as the new mission work in Long Lawford begins. You can read more in this Prayer Diary.

And what about the lower chambers (the ventricles)? Are we acting like the pumps in our physical bodies that send out nutrient rich blood? Well yes and no.

The Anglican churches in Rugby are all part of Rugby Revive which does so much to support Christian ministers in Rugby and to serve to people of all ages. They work through the local churches and ministries such as Rugby Youth For Christ, Christians Against Poverty, Hope 4, Healing on the Streets and Street Pastors and organise one off ventures like the week of mission leading up to the Queen's 90th birthday next month.

Although there has been a rural aspect to Rugby Revive it's never been really successful as the rural churches tend to work more closely within benefices. And work they do. For example the Draycote benefice is having a long interregnum but they are growing. Celebrate @ 4 – a café style worship service for all ages one Saturday each month - is attracting non churched people and some Christians who live locally but choose to worship elsewhere on Sunday. And it's not just in that benefice that growth is happening. The rest of the prayer diary will hint of some other stories from around our deanery.

But it can be hard. Some churches struggle with lack of money, lack of interest from their local community, odd parish boundaries and tired church members. Perhaps your church is a bit like that sometimes. If it is you'll understand why we need you to pray for us.

A New Adventure

In recent years the village of Long Lawford, on the outskirts of Rugby, has grown rapidly and will continue to do so. My husband, Stuart, and I have felt a growing sense of God's calling to the village to help develop a missional church which begins within the community itself; in small groups rather than beginning with the church, recognising that if we do mission then we get church, not other way round.

So in May 2016 we are starting this new adventure, and we are very excited to be working alongside the existing Anglican congregation at St John's and the Methodist church in the village, building on the excellent things that are already happening. Seeking where God is already at work, and seeing where He leads us. The model of church, that we feel this initiative will be based on, is groups in the community, with a focus on building relationships with each other and with Jesus, through Worship, bible and action which will enable us to grow as disciples and each group will become Church; which then join together to celebrate all that God is doing.

Author and Pastor Mike Breen says "If we make disciples we will always get church, try to build a church and we will rarely get disciples". So, small groups will be the key to discipling; encouraging a worshipping heart and being missional community, and we would like to work with those we know who already live in the community to open their homes for small groups; whilst continuing to build upon existing church, like the Messy church at Methodist church, enabling people to become disciples of Jesus in their context.

We value your prayers for Long Lawford and this new adventure, that God will be seen and known across the area.
