Words which are not said often enough? So let me start by saying 'THANK YOU!' to those of you who are now reading this Prayer Diary and who faithfully pray for our Diocese. You are unsung heroes and heroines and your faithfulness in prayer is much appreciated!

It struck me in thinking about this month's introduction to the prayer diary just how much we in an affluent and

relatively safe part of the world take for granted. I recall a visitor from a very poor area overseas remarking on how much pet food was on supermarket shelves in this country, when people in his part of the world were dying of starvation. If we have money in the bank, money in our wallet, and spare change somewhere around the house, we are among the richest 8% of the world's population. If we have a car, that puts us in the richest 7%. We can take too much for granted.

I had the privilege of being beside a parishioner dying of cancer in his bed, when he turned to look out of the window, and said, 'Isn't God good, Morris? Just look at the birds he has sent me to look at out of the window.' I had to turn my head and cry. This man in the utmost pain could still somehow thank God for the little pleasures of his life. I hope I can be so thankful when my time comes like that!

So, this month, let's try to give God and others more thanks than usual, and not take him, our situation, or others, for granted!

Living in a rural parish with a population of around 80 we can seem to be living in an idyllic bubble, not always realising the struggles that can face our brothers and sisters in the inner city and urban areas of our Diocese.

Here in Sutton-under-Brailes we are very privileged to have had a link with St. Catherine's Stoke Aldermoor since 2000. When we were planning a Christmas Tree Festival at Sutton (which told the

story of our faith from Creation through to the Cross and Resurrection) we also wanted to show that we were not an inward looking church. All the money raised was to go to another parish in our Diocese and so our link with St. Catherine's was born.

St. Catherine's congregation visit us about twice a year. Especially wonderful is when they come over for lunch on Rogation Sunday and join the afternoon service which is conducted around the village stopping at an orchard, a stream and a farm where the farmer explains about his animals and crops.

One of St. Catherine's churchwardens recently said how wonderful it was for their young people to visit an ancient village church. She loved seeing the joy on their faces as they explored the village and ran and played on our village green.

We enjoy worshipping at St Catherine's and it was very special for two of us to be there at the Revd Buff Forbes Stone's licensing. We look forward to continuing the link between our two parishes.

Another wonderful connection from this link is that we got to know the Revd Cleophas Lunga their former vicar. When he returned to Zimbabwe to be Bishop of Matabeleland, Sutton helped to collect toys for his wife Soneni to run a Toy Library and we still continue to support their work. (I even took my first long haul flight to visit Matabeleland!)

So our link with St. Catherine's has led us to a link with Zimbabwe. We never know where God is leading us!

#### **Retiring Reminisces**

I arrived in the Deanery of Shipston in 1979, being inducted as Vicar of Brailes and Rector of Sutton under Brailes on February 28th. I had been curate of Stockton, but after a chat with the then Archdeacon of Warwick the previous October, a visit to the retiring incumbent and an hour or two with the churchwardens, I was offered the living within the month – simple!

Some of the older parishioners were wary of the long haired, bearded,

guitar playing, motorbike riding 28 year old – but they soon realised that under the hairy exterior was a traditional and, I'm told, likeable chap. Numbers at the 11am services tripled in 12 months.

There were still many who remembered life before the war, when everybody knew everybody else. It seems incredible that the entire digital revolution has happened on my watch. In 1979, there were no domestic computers, no photocopiers, no answerphones, no mobiles, no satellite TV, and for some families a walk to the phone box to make a call.

The Deanery has altered. We now have 5 stipendiary and 4HD priests, down from 9 and 2. Sadly, 3 primary schools have closed – along with shops and other village amenities. Numbers at regular services in many churches have gone down significantly, but probably not to the same extent as urban areas. Contrasts between parishes are not so much "high or low" but "trad or mod." Many clergy have come and gone. The varied pressures of a multi parish benefice have proved too demanding for some. However, a living Christian faith is still clearly seen and our sturdy old churches are beacons of Christian faith, hope and love in our troubled times.

I have strived to serve God and his church; a church open to all and serving all parishioners, whether churchgoers or not, in times of both sorrow and of joy. I feel privileged to have worked in my parishes, sharing "the trivial round, the common task... a road to bring us daily nearer God."

### Reflecting on Shipston Deanery



In April I was privileged to have a profound spiritual experience. It was a long time coming and had long been a desire, but in April I finally had some wonderful views of a kingfisher. It was a glorious moment, but it wasn't only the kingfisher (which has been spoken of as a sign of the Spirit) that I found so inspiring, but the people in the hide with me. There was a strong sense of

expectation, enthusiasm, and patience within the hide, and the hope I had was that we could be like that before church worship!

Shipston Deanery is probably the most rural deanery, and one of its joys is the sheer range of wildlife. Within the deanery I have seen red kites, foxes, stoats, badgers, herons, kestrels, (and so many others) and now a glimpse of a kingfisher! It is a lovely area to live and work in, certainly, but sometimes is criticised as being a 'bubble' and 'unreal.' I disagree. With agriculture, (which has many challenges) and with various issues and problems that face rural communities (probably the same as urban but often hidden) there are possibilities for the Gospel in its fullness.

Part of my journey was to take more notice of some of the Bible that is often skipped over. Psalm 148 speaks about how all creation, not even just birds and animals, worship God, and Colossians 1 speaks about how Christ was the creator and reconciler of "all things," and I know, in my mind, I used to interpret that to mean "some people!"

Perhaps the rural churches, as well as others, are to be prophetic in terms of our engagement in the natural world, and creation care. There are many challenges to our natural world — climate change, habitat destruction, decrease in many populations, and many more. These are not simply 'material' issues for a secular world while the church focuses on 'spiritual issues.' If we believe in God who is creator and saviour, then engagement and action isn't just desirable but essential.
