

St Bartholomew's, Binley

St Bartholomew's is the parish church in Binley on the east side of Coventry. Binley is a large parish (population around 18000), consisting of several housing estates, an ex-mining village, a few farms and Coombe Country Park! We like to think of ourselves as a welcoming and friendly church (don't all churches?) and we seek to be a vibrant, Christ centred community which brings the good news of Jesus to everyone we can.

We're currently in the middle of our Alpha course which is going well. This is supported by the home groups who take it in turns to provide a wonderful meal each week. Last year we had a number of baptisms and confirmations after the course and a new small group was formed. We also have a monthly 'Messy church' which sees our hall full of families doing craft activities, worshipping together and sharing a meal.

Like most churches we're gearing up for Advent and our Christmas celebrations. This year we're looking to bless families in the parish with Christmas presents following a request we had from a local health visitor. We're also doing 'Reverse Advent Calendars,' where we add an item each day in Advent, and then have Christmas hampers to give away. In addition to our usual carol singing, Christingle and Crib services, this year we're holding a Christmas Tree festival, inviting local schools and other community groups to contribute a tree they've decorated.

This year we have been blessed to have two Family Link Workers in the parish. They've been working both in our church school and in the church, building links between the two. They've been running parenting courses, slow cooker projects, family fun days and lots more besides. It's been great to have them around.

There is always plenty going on at St Bartholomew's, with midweek groups for parents and toddlers and the elderly, craft groups and flower clubs. We're also building our links with Christians Against Poverty, supporting the Debt centre in Coventry, and running the CAP Money course.

I'm very grateful to be working alongside some very faithful servants of Christ and it's a privilege to serve God in this place.

December 2016


*"What came into existence was Life,
and the Life was Light to live by.
The Life-Light blazed out of the darkness;
the darkness couldn't put it out."*

(From the Gospel of John, chapter 1, 'The Message')

A look back at the events of this year does not give us the brightest picture of life in this world. The individual and precious lives of children, women and men are scarred by war, famine, poverty and homelessness, and the rhetoric of hatred, fear, self-preservation and national defence builds ever-higher barriers, casting longer shadows. In a world created for life and redeemed for 'life in all its fullness', we are seeing a vision of humanity's capacity to create a culture of death, to plunge ourselves and each other into the darkness.

In Advent we learn again that God's people must inhabit, trustfully and hopefully, that very darkness. Here we must wait, holding our own pain and the suffering of our neighbours, communities, and nations; recognising our need for God's Spirit to breathe life into our dying souls and this perishing world. *What came into existence was Life, and the Life was Light to live by.* The Light of the World, who was born a fragile baby in a darkened corner of an oppressed Middle East, lived from borrowed manger to borrowed tomb and carried the weight of our darkness to the depths of our death. But, *the darkness couldn't put it out.* The light of God blazes in the darkness and life bursts from the tomb.

With the coming of the Light of the World comes our calling. As Mary, young and unknown, bore the very life of the one true God into a broken world, so we are called to bear God's life in our world today. It is in the darkness that we must carry the Life-Light that will overcome it, as Mary carried the Son of God in her womb, in her arms and in her heart – the Saviour to redeem the world.

I am also vicar of St Anne and All Saints, a fairly small, authentic congregation in an area close to the city centre that has seen a huge increase in the number of young adults moving in as Coventry University has expanded. We have been blessed this year by the arrival of Ian Sweeney, part of the Acceler8 Team, who has helped us to develop and grow in our ministry to younger adults, including starting a new informal service, Crossover, and a discipleship group, Citizens. Both of these have seen growth and we are starting to see young adults coming to faith, including two full immersion baptisms this year and some confirmations.

In common with my brothers and sisters across the deanery we are involved not only in meeting the spiritual needs of our population but also their material needs, and we are involved in Coventry Food Bank, Coventry Winter Night Shelter and Street Pastors amongst other things. Across our patch we also find the churches running various lunch clubs, breakfast clubs, uniform groups, stay and plays, Messy Church, school services, job clubs, mental health courses, debt relief and advice surgeries. This is a varied and often challenging place to worship and minister and we are hugely grateful for the generosity of others in the diocese who, via the support fund, enable us to function as we do. We are seeing growth in the kingdom of God despite the challenges and we eagerly anticipate that there is more to come...

St Margaret, Ball Hill



I have been at St Margaret's church, Ball Hill for the last year on an extended placement as part of my curacy with a focus on young adults. This way of shaping training provides an opportunity to lead in places where change is needed, a great way to learn and try out new things whilst still new to ordained ministry.

The church is located in an area densely populated with students, young families and new arrivals to the city. The area is vibrant, multicultural and full of life, but not affluent, and all of these aspects of the locality are reflected in the people of the church. They have seen some turbulent times in the past, and when I arrived they wanted a new lease of life, but were unsure how to begin.

We have had a challenging but great year, with the first full immersion baptism at St Margaret's, a party for the Queens' birthday attended by many local people, the arrival of new families, an Alpha course, hosting a Bishop's Certificate in Discipleship and Mission module attended by church members, and more. We also became part of a new parish, All Saints, in July, joining with the church of St Anne and All Saints to form a partnership with bringing the light of Christ to our local community at its heart. The two churches are very different in charisma and calling, but this has provided a unique opportunity to provide different expressions of faith from the same parish, sharing the gospel with distinctiveness but as part of a new gathering of the people of God in this part of the city. It is an exciting venture!

Plans for the coming months include a Christmas fayre, undertaking our second 8EQ survey and launching a second service. So much change and so many new opportunities can be daunting, so we would welcome prayer for a deepening of faith and relationships, within the people of the church, across the two locations of All Saints, and most of all with those who live alongside us and need to know the love of Jesus.
