

# Focus on Nuneaton deanery

Happy New Year from the frozen north! Nuneaton Deanery is the most northerly deanery in the Diocese. It has one of the largest populations in the Church of England and continues to grow with lots of new housing developments in various stages of building. Nuneaton itself is the largest town in Warwickshire. We have a lot of clergy posts, although currently many of these are vacant posts, mainly due to clergy retirements. It is also one of the poorer areas of Coventry and Warwickshire Diocese, as confirmed in recent Church Urban Fund research.

The Deanery Chapter has a mixture of stipendiary, self-supporting and retired clergy, from a range of traditions. We have an interesting mix of rural and suburban churches and we endeavour to support each other as much as we can. The Deanery is currently subsidised financially to the level of two full-time posts by other Deaneries in the Diocese, for which we are extremely grateful. We are however starting to take up the challenge of supporting each other financially rather than relying on help from outside.

There are good signs of growth across the Deanery, both spiritually and numerically. We were pleased to welcome the BCDM course to the north when one of the modules was hosted in Nuneaton and it was well attended. We look forward to another module in the new year. Another area of growth has been Messy Church. Churches that have been running Messy Church have been sharing their experience with other churches and now it is growing across the Deanery in both rural and suburban settings.

Our churches have also been working with our ecumenical partners to help transform our communities. An example of this is our churches providing volunteers, financial support and hosting facilities for the Nuneaton Foodbank, which distributes food to those in need every weekday. On average 260 adults and 100 children are helped every month. The churches also work together to run the Nuneaton Winter Night Shelter from 1<sup>st</sup> December to 28<sup>th</sup> February. We provide a hot meal and overnight accommodation for up to 10 homeless people every night.

Please pray for us as we try to build God's kingdom here.

# Prayer Diary

## January 2017

*'And the glory of the Lord shone around them and they were terrified.' (Lk 2.9)*



The season of Epiphany invites us to witness and to respond to the *glory* of God. The shepherds, surrounded by the light of the glory of God, are surrounded by the song of the angels giving glory to God: *'Glory to God in the highest...'*. When the Magi eventually are led to the Christ child, God's glory is made manifest to them. In Epiphany too we celebrate the shining out (epiphany) of the glory of God, the Holy Trinity as Jesus is baptised by his cousin John in the Jordan. In Epiphany also we are reminded of what St John the Evangelist describes as the first of the signs by which Jesus revealed his glory at the wedding at Cana, water into wine.

Just as when Moses encounters the light and fire of the glory of God in the burning bush at Sinai, just as Peter, James and John are overwhelmed by the light of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ on the mountain, the uncreated glory of God is revealed through Christ and His creation. The revelation of the glory of God is not so much the revealing of something new as the 'unveiling' of what already is.

So this month we might wish to pray especially that our eyes and the eyes of our hearts (Eph.1.18) be opened to the glory of God. We might pray that we know with St Paul that *'It is God who said "Let light shine out of darkness" who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.'* 2 Cor.4.6.

We respond to the glory of God by giving glory to God. Every time we do this, we join with the whole company of heaven. Ignatius of Antioch, shortly before his martyrdom, wrote *'we must meet more often to give glory to God.'*

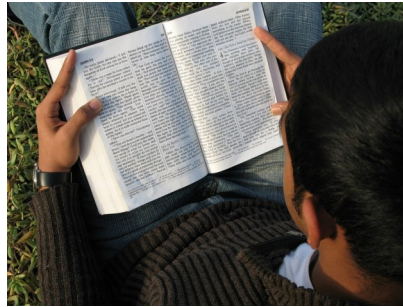
*Glory to God in the highest and peace to his people on earth...*

## Open the Book

Have you ever thought that children in schools might be missing out on what the Bible has to show them? They could go through their entire school life without ever learning about Adam and Eve, Noah, David, Jonah or even the life of Jesus and the stories of the New Testament.

“OPEN THE BOOK” offers a programme of themed and dramatised Bible stories to local primary or infant schools. Each session is around 10 minutes long and fits comfortably into the school’s regular assembly slot. Our team of volunteer storytellers use drama, mime, props, costume - even the children and staff themselves - to present Bible stories in ways that are lively, engaging, informative and great fun for everyone involved! We never have any shortage of volunteers to get involved!



Currently we visit two schools in Nuneaton – All Saints Church of England Primary School and Nursery, and Chilvers Coton Infant School. There is a real contrast with one being a church school and the other having children who are mainly Muslim, however, we are welcomed and valued in both schools!

Our team is a “gang of five” but there is always space and need for new recruits. We tell the Bible stories during the assembly on Wednesday and Thursday afternoons each week.

We began in 2013 with a Saturday making props and then we delivered two stories as a pilot project to see how it would work. It was such a success that we soon registered as an official “Open the Book” team which gives us access to all sorts of resources and advice on making props.

The children love it. The staff love it. The team love it. We have even had Ofsted inspectors’ approval, so God must be blessing this project! We have built up great relationships with the schools, staff and pupils alike, and it is not uncommon to be greeted in the supermarket by children recognising us from Open the Book. Both schools now visit the church regularly for their own special services.

Why not get a team together from your local churches? You will not regret it!

## Acceler8 in Nuneaton



I have had the privilege of working in the Acceler8 team since November 2015, initially at St. Mary’s, Leamington Spa and now at St. Nicolas, Nuneaton since September this year. The role of a 20s-30s Development Leader is as diverse as the age range would suggest. We’ve been entrusted with freedom to fulfil our aim of making new disciples in the 20s and 30s age group and supporting the young adults within our churches.

My approach to the roles at St. Mary’s and St. Nicolas has been quite different. St. Mary’s has an established core of 20s and 30s and scored strongly in the Holistic Small Groups category of the NCD survey. Therefore, I focused predominantly on evangelism and encouraging young people to explore their spiritual gifts and potential.

As I came to faith at St. Mary’s five years ago in my late 20s, I felt God was prompting me to move on and challenge myself in a different church context. This led me to St. Nicolas which has fewer young people, though is seeing exciting growth through Messy Church and its school links.

I immediately established a fortnightly 20s and 30s group called L.E.D. To date we have had 7 events, spiritual and social, which have been well received. We have a core of approximately 10 regulars and had around 30 people attend our most popular gathering. Due to the breadth of this age range and the busy nature of their lives, every event has been different and we vary the times and days of our meetings to accommodate as many people as possible.

My current focus is to build relationships with those already within and around St. Nicolas and help them on their faith journeys. I’m also assisting St. Nicolas in becoming more appealing to young people and have recently redesigned their website.

I love seeing Jesus radically transforming lives. I am looking forward to helping more people across Nuneaton and Bedworth deepen their relationships with Him.
