

Chaplaincy in the workplace

Early in 2016 and following a helpful session at Deanery Synod when Paul Simmonds spoke on the value of chaplaincy in the work place, the PCC of St Peter and St John decided this was something we could be offering to the many small businesses on the large industrial estate in our parish.

We created an attractive card with all the church details and a personal letter from myself (with a photo) explaining the kind of things we offer that might be of interest to their employees. We acknowledged that whilst very big firms often engage a chaplain, this isn't possible for small businesses. But we all need support, we said, so we offered them a listening ear, a life skills course to enhance mental wellbeing and 'a worshipping community praying for your business to thrive'.

Although we haven't yet had anyone directly seek the support of a chaplain, the card was well received and on the back of that initiative we held a business leader's breakfast early one Friday morning in the early spring. From this we have been blessed with a lot of good will from local firms towards the church. Our railings were repainted in one day by two local firms with paint donated by a third, two local youth schemes came and redecorated two different rooms in church. The builders of a new housing development came and put two large raised beds in our garden for free, enabling the formation of an a new initiative — the 'PJ Veg Beds' group growing vegetables for our community. The same developers accepted the gift of a welcome pack from us for each of their new homes which contained all our church information and a packet of seeds.

Focus on Rugby Deanery

Hi, I am Tim Cockell and I am the new Area Dean for Rugby. When I say new, I am certainly not new to the Rugby Deanery, in fact I am among the longest serving clergy in the area having ministered in two different Rugby parishes in the last 18 ½ years. So, you would think I know quite a bit about what is going on around the place. Actually, not as much as you might think!

It's so easy for us to become parochial and focus on just our own bit of God's Kingdom and on what we are doing locally to fulfil the Diocesan Mission Statement. Over the last three months, though, I have become more aware of just what I don't know about the Deanery. But the amazing thing is, that in discovering more of what is going on in our parishes I can't help be struck by the sheer variety of events and initiatives that churches are engaged in and just how committed people are to bringing the love of Christ through acts of service and worship to the communities in which they are set. There is a staggering amount going on. It also serves as reminder that we have much to learn from each other as there is likely to be someone else who has done something along similar lines and has experience they can share to help us in our plans.

Planning for future of the Deanery is something that is very much in our minds at the moment – not surprising with a new Area Dean! The Deanery feels about the right size to be able to work on issues that are common to us all. There has already been some movement on this in the last year or so with a regular Churchwardens' Forum being set up where ideas and information are exchanged and where a sense of togetherness and mutual support can be fostered. A small team has also been working on the issue of Giving and how the Deanery can support and encourage churches with what can be a difficult issue.

It is my hope and prayer that we might be able in the coming year to draw our parishes closer together and make the Deanery a more cohesive unit. I also hope that during this month of focus on the Rugby Deanery that you will join with us in praying for this greater sense of togetherness.

Keeping positive in an interregnum...The Draycote Benefice

Like any parishes in vacancy, we were absolutely delighted when our new Rector, Revd Ali Massey, was installed in September 2016, drawing to an end our long interregnum of over two and a half years. But, interestingly, when we recruited Rev Ali, one of the things that attracted her to us, and vice versa, was that she wanted to work alongside us in ministry, rather than join us and 'take over'. We churchwardens were definitely ready for her spiritual leadership, but we all felt a big degree of encouragement at how well we had not only 'kept the ship afloat' but actually kept it moving in, what can sometimes be, choppy waters.

An interregnum isn't an easy time. We definitely appreciated the support of retired clergy to lead our Eucharistic worship. But we learned and we grew to lead most of our own non-Eucharistic worship ourselves with services having an element of informality, and having purchased a portable Audio Visual kit, we are now making use of that in our worship.

One of our biggest success stories has been a Saturday afternoon worship called 'Celebrate@4' which we introduced whilst in vacancy, and is entirely led and managed by laity. This has continued even since Rev Ali has been appointed, with both her blessing and her encouragement. It's very informal, held monthly in a village hall, commences with refreshments, with the service lasting 40 minutes. It consists of singing using backing tracks and words on screen, an interactive talk using video, drama or story, and some simple prayers. We finish by sharing a blessing. It's targeted at families with simple activities for children, who are encouraged to join in. It is noisy and busy but always fun! We have had a service on a farm and made our own Christmas video!

Working together, laughing and exchanging good news, sharing problems, trying new things, asking for help when you need it, and offering help when you can. This is what we have learned are the ingredients of a healthy interregnum.
