## Fresh Start helps people begin anew



Over the last ten months Fresh Start, a new project by Together for Change, has been befriending and providing practical support for refugees, migrants and asylum seekers in Coventry. Led by Cultural Links Worker, Matt Robinson, Fresh Start has established a number of exciting initiatives and has seen God work in some amazing ways.

Fresh Start’s Saturday morning football sessions successfully kicked off earlier this year. Around 40 men – about 15 locals from different churches and 25 refugees, migrants and asylum seekers – meet together every Saturday to play football and build relationships. Football is an international language and has proved to be a great way for the men to get to know each other. The group often goes for lunch together afterwards at Coventry Vineyard Church to deepen friendships. The Fresh Start Companionship project is also in full swing. This project pairs up volunteers with newly arrived individuals. Volunteers offer a listening ear, assistance with English, and a friend to walk alongside the new arrivals as they take their first steps in building a new life.

Twice a week Matt and a few volunteers run Conversation Cafes in Coventry city centre. Currently around 12-15 refugees and asylum seekers attend each session in the Belgrade Theatre café. The group gathers together in the café then splits down into smaller groups to chat for a couple of hours. Each session will revolve around a different topic such as Coventry’s history, British values and education. These sessions do not only give participants the opportunity to practise their English in an informal setting but also bring people together. One of the participants, Hafizur comments that he “really likes coming to the conversation cafes. They have a relaxing atmosphere and it is good that they are close to the city centre.” Another participant, Abdulla says “practising conversation is very important. It is great to speak to lots of different people.”

# The rocking vicar



The diocese encourages all clergy to pursue a hobby outside of ministry. For some it will be playing squash, for others it will be cooking or baking. But the Reverend Pam Howell's hobby is a bit different – she is the lead singer of Coventry based rock band, The Koalas.

Pam, the Vicar of St John the Divine, Willenhall, has been singing with the band for almost twenty years. The band was formed from the music group at St Mark's, Leamington Spa, where Pam was a member of the congregation before ordination. Pam's husband, Mark, and their friend, Peter Hill, had a passion for rock music and were keen to play outside of church too. They invited Pam to join in 1997 when the band's name was "Look Both Ways" but Pam chose the name 'The Koalas' after picking a random word in a newspaper she was reading. The name stuck.

Over the last twenty years The Koalas have evolved. The band is now based in Coventry and is comprised of Pam as lead vocalist; Pam's husband Mark as lead guitarist; Patrick Gordon on the keyboard, Steve Bastock on drums and Dan Wood as the bass player.

Even though all members of the band have to be up early on Sunday morning, they still play the occasional Saturday night gig for weddings and parties. Recently, they played to raise funds for St John the Divine. Also on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> August, some band-members played at "Willen-all Together," a multi-cultural celebration in Willenhall that brought the whole community together and showcased music from different cultures.
