### The Sheepdog



Much of my driving is along country lanes, with fields spreading out on either side. On one side the fields slope gently, and one of our local sheep farmers was standing there, gazing intently into the distance.

‘What are you looking at?’ asks I. ‘Bringing my sheep home,’ he replies. ‘Surely you can’t do that

from here?’ ask I. ‘No,’ says he, ‘but my dog can. I know I can trust her to bring them safely home.’

And there, several fields and several hundred yards away, his dog was faithfully and quietly rounding up his flock of sheep, and bringing them safely home. ‘I trust her to bring them safely home’. An enduring image, which spoke beautifully of the way in which God trusts us to bring his sheep safely home. Like the sheep dog, we may have to go quite a long way from home, and sometimes they can take a bit of rounding up, but that is what we are tasked to do – go out to wherever they are, seek them out, and bring them safely home.

God trusts us: he trusts us with the gospel itself, and he trusts us to take it to the furthest corners. He trusted the first disciples, and there was no Plan B if they failed. He trusts us to care for his sheep. He has taught us, and continues to teach us, what to do. And he watches intently, with us every step of the way. The sheepdog’s acute hearing is finely tuned to her master’s voice – she has to keep listening. She is being his hands and feet, eyes and ears, working together in this task. We too have to keep listening, and be God’s hands and feet, eyes and ears.

It is an awesome responsibility for the dog: the care of the sheep is placed in her charge. It is an even more awesome responsibility for us: God places the care of his sheep in our charge, and trusts us to find them and bring them back to him.

## Being a pioneer minister in a benefice of seven rural churches

I joined Coventry Diocese a year ago taking up a post as pioneer and associate minister in the south Warwickshire seven benefice of churches. When I first saw the post advertised I confess I wasn’t really that sure of what being a pioneer in a rural area involved. I’m still not that sure but here are some of my reflections.



Being a pioneer in a rural setting involves being willing to talk about Jesus outside the walls of our church buildings. This may not seem especially revolutionary but there is a definite sense here that talk about God should be kept to church services on a Sunday. In an era where the majority of the population went to church this wasn’t such a problem. But when only a minority come to church regularly and when a majority would struggle even to step into a church building, taking the Gospel outside the walls of the church has become an absolute necessity.

Doing this in our culture involves a high degree of relational investment. In our benefice we have very limited resources both in terms of people and money so an approach to mission which focuses on events and programmes is ultimately unworkable. To communicate the Gospel effectively in this setting therefore involves the slow and often costly work of sharing people’s lives, gaining their trust and opening up opportunities to ‘give a reason for the hope that we have.’ Happily in the villages I minister this often means time spent in the pub or eating food in people’s homes!

The bible verse which best summarises this dual aspect comes from Paul’s first letter to the Thessalonians

*Because we loved you so much, we were delighted to share with you not only the gospel of God but our lives as well. (1 Thess. 2:8)*

This of course is what all Christians are called whether lay or ordained, pioneer or not. As a pioneer I hope to model, in a flawed and imperfect way, this calling that each of us have. To share both our lives and the Gospel with a world that desperately needs to hear of Jesus. May God give us the grace and strength we need to fulfil this calling.

## Moving into rural ministry

When thinking about coming to serve in Brailes, Sutton under Brailes, Tysoe, Oxhill and Whatcote I tried to find out what was special about these places. Drina and I tried to visit incognito but found that it was impossible to enter into these villages without being spotted. We were struck by the feeling that this was a special place and this was confirmed by the welcome we received from the people. Moving into rural ministry was something new to me and was a complete change from everything I had experienced in town and city ministry before.



I was struck by the community spirit in each one of the villages but also surprised that these communities seemed to work as independent groups, not sharing with the other villages in the benefices. Whilst that strong sense of individual community is a very powerful force I wonder how much more can be achieved by working together. Great steps had been made in that direction in many areas and I hope to be able to build on that work.

When I came for the interview virtually everyone said “you know it will be challenging” and they weren’t wrong. But another way to look at a challenge is to see it as an opportunity. After being licensed on Wednesday night I had my first funeral in my new post on the Friday and on Saturday the Scarecrow Festival at Oxhill, the Church and School Fair at Brailes and the Church fair at Tysoe! Then on the Sunday in addition to officiating at three services and calling into a fourth there was the Centenary Celebration of Tysoe WI in the afternoon.

Yes they were right, it is challenging, but one thing Rural Ministry is not, is boring! If people try to tell you it’s quiet and there’s nothing happening then they are mistaken. The Gospel in the community and the church are very much alive and active in the countryside, if you don’t believe me come and see for yourself.

## God is For Today—GiFT



During our recent interregnum a small but committed group of parents asked if they could restart the youth group using its original name, GiFT. Two had very successfully helped to run the earlier group in Stourdene Benefice before it closed.

To have good people offering to reopen the group was too good an opportunity to miss and one dark cold Thursday night in late January the group re-emerged with a handful of young people meeting once every two weeks in the church at Ettington.

The leaders received some informal but inspirational training from Esther Loxley, the youth worker in Shipston, and were joined for this by some junior leaders – older teenagers who had been in the original group and wanted to help it restart.

There is a tuck shop and assorted activities that are wrapped around a theme which is currently “Harvesting our Talents”. Soon they will look at “Dark and Light” with themes relating to the Church’s calendar but designed to suit young people. Towards Christmas they aim to prepare an entry for the Ettington Christmas Tree Festival.

Earlier in the year, GiFT followed homelessness as their theme and as part of that they held a sleepover in Ettington Church one evening in July. The evening began with a barbeque which was very well supported by the local community and included a film prepared by Shelter, the charity for the homeless. There were also some games like eating donuts on the end of a string! The sleepover was a sponsored event and together with donations, around £300.00 was raised for the work of Shelter. This was followed up by a very powerful session where someone who had been homeless himself spoke of his experiences as a homeless person. The popularity of this evening has helped to boost numbers and goodwill for the GiFT.

By many standards this is a small group but it is growing steadily and presenting the Gospel message in a practical and relevant way to young people in a small rural community. It is a real beacon of light, hope and encouragement in our rural ministry.
